

I'm sure we can all remember being young, when the long lazy days of summer stretched out before us. Unfortunately, those summer holidays never seemed to last as long as everyone hoped, and September and the return to the regular routine came along far too quickly. The unseasonable weather this year makes it feel as if summer has not yet arrived (though my 'weather app' is still informing me that a heatwave is imminent). Hopefully by the time you are reading this, it will have been proved right, for once!

Thank you once again for your very kind welcome a few weeks ago. Special words of appreciation must go to Malcolm and Paule, and to the PCC, who kept everything on course during the (thankfully!) short vacancy. And of course, we cannot forget Father Keith and Father John who continue to help out, and for whose support and prayers I am most grateful.

It's to be expected that a new priest will want to do things differently, and I will not be an exception. For the time being however, I am letting things stay as they are, but you may notice some minor changes over the coming weeks and months.

It's always difficult to talk about money. Finance will always be a worry for most parishes, and St Symphorian's is in the same boat. While we are indeed fortunate to have some regular sources of income, day to day expenditure can make sudden demands on cash flow, and we really cannot afford to sit back and do nothing. Everyone is asked to give with a generous heart, to give what they can — whether that be small or large. One thing, however, that everyone can do — and without creating any extra financial demand on us — is to pray. Pray that God will bring the good work that he has begun here to fulfilment. Pray earnestly that we may be given the resources we need to carry out God's work. Pray in the words that Jesus gave us: 'thy kingdom come...give us this day our daily bread'.

As you know, I'm balancing my ministry at St Symphorian's with another halftime post in the Bishop's Office in Chichester. At the moment, the plan is that I will be in Chichester until after lunch on Monday to Thursday. (Slight exception on Tuesday, as I will offer the morning Mass

here at 10am and leave for Chichester after that. Nominally, Friday will be my day off. However, I will review this after a few weeks, as it may need to be adapted going forward.

It is my prayer that these summer weeks may be a time of joy, happiness and peace. May God bless each one of you. Let us continue to pray for each other.

It has come to our attention that people are unaware of the following:

- The Church is **NOT** funded by central government. We receive no funds from the central Government unless we are successful in a grant application for specific, restricted funds.
- The only funds St Symphorian's Church receives is from the rent from the curate's house, hiring out of the Parish Centre, fundraising events and the generous donations from the worshipping community and friends.
- The church's expenses are rising at the same rate as domestic expenses.
- There are FREE funds available for our church if YOU, the church family and friends, are willing to help us receive them.

To help us receive <u>free funds</u> please follow the following easy steps:

- If you are a taxpayer, sign up for gift aid see over the page for a form.
 Completed forms should be returned to the parish office.
 Now ensure all your giving is made through the bank or the Parish
 Giving Scheme if you have an account. Your donations need to be
 identifiable. Donations for tea, coffee, candles etc can all be made this
 way too. Just state what you donation is for in the reference.
- If you are a non-taxer payer please make all your donations in cash at church – in the basket at the back of church or the wall safe. We can earn an extra 25% on the first £8,000 we receive like this each year through the small donations giving scheme. This can give the church an extra £2,000 per year – but it doesn't yet!
 - Sign up and use easyfundraising. This is for internet purchases. If you
 do you weekly shopping on-line, booking your holiday or just general
 purchase this could all earn the church much needed cash.

It's now over to you to help us grow the churches finances for free. Let's see what you can do.

Tales from the West Country (7)...

With water on three sides, folk of the western counties are seafarers by nature, never more so than in the Elizabethan age when the Atlantic and worlds beyond beckoned, and the Reformation divide an added spur.

Instance Sir Walter Raleigh, soldier, sea-captain, explorer, coloniser, Court favourite, executed in the end to appease an outraged Spain. East Budleigh in South Devon, his birthplace, has a bronze statue, paid for by the British America Tobacco Co. (He introduced the profitable habit to England). In America, Raleigh County is named in his honour in West Virginia, also the state capital in Carolina, and a mountain in British Columbia, to note a few other memorials. The Victorian painter Millais holidayed in Budleigh Salterton, working on 'The Boyhood of Raleigh', a copy of which decorated my Devon primary school classroom.

His own religious views can be illustrated. Out for a ride at home, he encountered an old lady praying her rosary. Dismounting, he snatched and broke the offending article in pieces, telling her angrily that such things were no longer permitted.

The Pilgrim Fathers followed in his footsteps when their ship 'Mayflower' put into Dartmouth and then Plymouth to assess the seaworthiness of its companion, the 'Speedwell', and they sailed without her. Across the ocean, Plymouth Rock marks their landing. Originally known as Plymouth Colony, it was divided into Plymouth County, Barnstable County and Bristol County for administrative purposes.

Westward Ho! is a romantic novel published in 1855 set in those times and in particular in North Devon. In Bideford is a statue of its author, Charles Kingsley, looking very upright and authoritarian, as well it might, for he

was a very distinguished Victorian. Born at Holne in South Devon, he grew up in Clovelly where his father was the incumbent, and was himself later ordained. He went on to become Regius Professor of History at Cambridge, private tutor to the undergraduate Prince of Wales, a Chaplain to Queen Victoria. and Canon of both Chester Cathedral and Westminster Abbey.

He was a keen advocate of social reform, a leading member of the Christian Socialist Movement, writing political pamphlets under the name of Parson Lot, as well as other novels, including *Hereward the Wake,* a heroic tale of Anglo-Saxon resistance to the Normans in the fens. In addition, he was a personal friend of T.H. Huxley ('Darwin's Bulldog') and in touch with the scientific developments of the day.

Kingsley was a robust Protestant, an example of what came to be called 'muscular Christianity', a method of character-building in the schools through sports leading to active pursuit of Christian ideals in personal and public life thereafter. Thomas Hughes ('Tom Brown's Schooldays') was another advocate. The phrase first appeared in a review of one of Kingsley's novels, the validity of which he acknowledged. Predictably, he scorned Newman and the Oxford Movement's attempt to recover the Catholic roots of the Anglican Church, and his adverse comments called forth Newman's classic spiritual defence, his *Apologia*.

The hero of *Westward Ho!* is Amyas Leigh, a Devon youth who goes to sea with Drake, and it is a tale of a struggle of a sturdy Protestant people against the wiles of the Spanish Inquisition and Jesuits. It purports to convey the ethos of Elizabeth's time, but certainly contains much of Kingsley himself. Ten years after its publication, an enterprising individual cashing in on the Victorian love of seaside holidays, needed a catchy name for the venue he was developing on the North Devon coast. Thus the popular resort of Westward Ho! was born.

Stay Vocal

(Worthing Dementia-Friendly Community Choir)

Every second Wednesday of the month, our church becomes a café and rehearsal venue for 'Stay Vocal'. The choir was set up by Lynsey Tran, Worthing Dementia-Friendly Co-ordinator, (some of you may remember her from last year's Lent Lunches when she gave a talk). She is supported by Dementia Friendly Worthing, whose aim is to enable people living with dementia to live a full life in their community, and to support their carers and family.

St Symphorian's involvement began just over a year ago when the church was offered, with no charge, for rehearsals as their current room was not big enough. Many of us have a connection to someone with dementia/Alzheimer's so this was close to many people's hearts, and a great outreach opportunity. The first choir session was in March 2023 with Ric, the choir master, Lynsey, bringing refreshments and welcoming, and Sandra, preparing the church, serving and clearing up.

This choir in our church has been a great success. We have couples, individuals with dementia, carers whose partners are now in a home or have sadly died, Stay Active, a group of seven living in their own homes who come in a minibus with three carers, and people brought from care homes. The numbers grow every month, with an average thirty plus each session. The coffee and biscuit time is almost as important as the singing, a time of fellowship and shared experiences. Ric is now the welcomer, as well as choir master. He is trained in Cognitive Stimulation Therapy. I'm usually supported by a helper from Dementia Friendly Worthing.

Then everyone moves to the front of the church where Ric has his set up of recorded music and words on a large monitor. Ric leads the singing in his Welsh baritone voice giving lots of encouragement. The songs range from the 40s, 50s, and 60s. The last ten minutes are always the same, wartime favourites, finishing with 'We'll Meet Again'.

The repeated programme and familiar venue are so important to people with dementia. Many of them have said how they love the church building, how warm and welcoming it feels. They all leave uplifted by their session, as are Ric and the team. Lynsey has secured funding for the

next three years so no-one is asked for donations as dealing with money is something that can be confusing for someone with dementia.

Each December Stay Vocal hold a Carol concert and a local school choir joins them. Parents, families and dignitaries come along and fill the church. And of course, Bob the Town Crier. (The Town Cryers also support the choir). A concert and celebration in the hall for the King's coronation was a highlight last summer.

Ric now leads three monthly dementia-friendly choirs and on Wednesday 9th October at 11.00am, 'Stay Vocal' from St Symphorian's and 'Trinity Sunshine' from Storrington, are holding a joint concert, led by Ric at St Symphorian's Church. Everyone is welcome to come and enjoy.

This is a community choir so please feel free to come along and join in on any second Wednesday of the month. And I'd love some help with refreshments!

Imara Uganda Education Fund – Major Project Progress Update on the Creation of a Secondary School Education Facility at Ngetta, Northern Uganda.

It is really encouraging to report on the progress being made to establish Secondary Education for blind children at the Ngetta Primary School facility we have been supporting as a church for many years now.

The first Phase includes 8 classrooms, Offices, Toilets and a Staff Room.

Belinda Maclean, Leader of Imara Uganda Education Fund manages all our charities activities. She is working with Kevin Daniella Acen - our Leader in Uganda who was educated for the latter part of her studies through our Scholarship programme. She qualified in Accountancy and is now Executive Head of our Uganda Team

In a recent conversation Belinda told me the new Secondary School project opened in February and has 11 students. It has capacity to accommodate all blind students from Ngetta Primary School who pass the qualifying level for Secondary education. The problem is that many families just cannot afford school fees. This year the proposal will be that our Alternative Christmas Card donations will target blind children of families who cannot pay school fees. Secondary school fees are around £150.00 per term.

This video is just 7 minutes and includes pictures of students and the new school building. It gives a glimpse of some of the work we are doing through Kevin and her NGO - Itinga Charity Education Foundation. It is also most encouraging that with her leadership there has been an additional feature in funding for the new building work. Through Kevin's enterprise, donations from Uganda and other non – Imara sources are also now being received and will hopefully grow under Kevin's leadership. Please pray for the development of this funding stream through media links such as Linkedin.

Pictures 1 and 2 show the inaugural student group outside and in class. **Picture 3** shows students having a lesson in blind football. The man in white shirt, (blind himself), runs an organisation that is encouraging









football for the blind. He spent a weekend with the students. The ball has bells in it and a sighted person stands behind the goal posts clapping. Sighted Players wear masks.

Picture 4 shows the new Secondary School facility built by Imara-Uganda Education Fund.

Regular Giving by Direct Debit

The Parish Giving Scheme (PGS) is a secure and simple way of giving to St Symphorian's Church on a regular monthly basis (or quarterly or annually if you prefer). It works by making a Direct Debit from your bank account on the 1st of the month, which is credited to our parish bank account by the 10th of the month. If eligible, you can opt to add Gift Aid and PGS claims this on our behalf, passing it back to [church] which benefits our cash flow.

Optional Annual Increases

If you opt to increase your gift annually, PGS will write to you and advise you of the new amount. If this is acceptable you don't need to do anything, but you can choose to add more or to decrease the amount if you wish. If the majority of our planned givers were to opt for this, it would have a huge impact on our finances. Like many churches, one of the problems we face is that of 'static giving', often through inertia rather than intention.

One-Off Giving


It is also possible to make a one-off gift online and add Gift Aid if you are eligible. Instead of setting up a new Direct Debit, you use a debit or credit card, Apple Pay or Google Pay. Scan the QR code to get started.



'Stargazers' by Harriet Evans

A beautifully written tale about the rite of passage of two young sisters facing life with all its challenges. The author sets the scene for the reader, masterfully conveying the values, ethics and traditions woven through the fabric of 1950s post-war Britain to the present day.

The story centres around two sisters growing up amidst an abusive, controlling relationship with their mother. The harsh realities of life unfold to give us a snapshot of the girls' lives from childhood to adults,

Along the way they are thrown lifelines by complete strangers who are able to bring relief and happiness to the sisters' lives by guiding them along life's different paths. When one of the sisters gets one solitary birthday card from her one and only friend at school, this is when her life changes and she is finally able to cut the ties from her mother, embark on her journey of healing and the pursuit of happiness.

The author has written a powerfully embroidered story which is absorbing and well crafted.

For the Parish it has meant that giving could not be simpler. To register with the Parish giving scheme just follow this link:



Using Parish giving has reduced the workload of both the Parish treasurer and the gift aid co-ordinator. This is simply because all the donations received from PGS are received in one bulk payment rather than numerous individual payments and any gift aid is claimed automatically each month.

PGS can be used for regular giving or one-off donations. The process is simple and painless. For regular giving, your donation will be collected from your bank account on the first of each month and will be transferred to the church's bank account by 10th of the month. Soon after any gift aid applicable will also be received into the church's bank account. Your donation can be managed



simply on line as your circumstances change. You can also click a button and each year you will be invited to increase you giving in line with inflation. It could not be simpler. If you haven't

Buildings Update

After lots of waiting some things have begun to move forward. The faculty (the ecclesiastical version of planning permission which also covers Listed Places of Building permission) has been agreed and we can move forward with the demolition work. This is an expensive business, and to make sure we have the cashflow funds for this project, the PCC has agreed to an Archdeacons' loan. Unlike most loans, this is at 0% interest and can be paid over 5 years from the Sharp interest as it is a project on the church building. It is not unusual for our PCC to take out an Archdeacon's loan; we have had them for the heating system in 2017 and more recently for the porch roof of the church hall in 2015/6 which was paid off in 2022.

As far as the church hall is concerned, we are making slow progress with grant applications. There are numerous hurdles to jump just to be invited to apply for a number of grants. But we are trying several avenues and hope to have good news at some point.

In the meantime, we are also looking at the heating system for the main hall and will attempt to get this replaced as soon as possible too.

Thank you for the support for our coffee mornings. We plan to make this a regular feature. Our next one will be at the end of July and then we will take a break due to the August holidays and work for the Fete. We hope to see you 27th July.

Don't forget the Garden Working Party on Saturday 6th July. Jill is working so hard in the gardens, please come and support her work.



It's when things go wrong that you mustn't quit.


