From the Vicarage

January can often catch us in two moods at once. Part of us is recovering from the whirlwind of Christmas: carol services, family gatherings, shopping, and the general busyness of it all. And suddenly we find ourselves at the threshold of a brand new year, staring at a blank calendar and wondering what the next twelve months might hold.

In the Church, January of course, is shaped by Epiphany, a feast that can seem small on the surface but is full of depth. The Magi's story speaks freshly every year: travellers who set out with hardly any information, just a star and a longing for something true. Most of us step into a new year a bit like that too—hopeful, but not entirely sure where the road will lead.

Epiphany reassures us that God doesn't expect us to see the whole map. A little light is enough: small signs can guide us just as surely as the star guided the Magi.

January is also a month when many people try something new. You'll hear of people doing "Dry January," or even "Veganuary", an invitation to be more mindful about what we eat and the impact we have on the world around us. Whether or not we take part, the whole idea reflects something quite Christian: the sense that small, intentional choices can shape us and open ourselves up to renewal.

Perhaps this is what January offers us spiritually too—not grand resolutions, but small, realistic steps, and perhaps a little more attention to God's quiet presence in everyday life.

So as we begin this new year, may we follow the Magi's steady courage, trusting that the light we have is enough. And may Christ, revealed to the nations, be revealed afresh to us—in our choices, our habits, and our hope for the year ahead.

Tales from the 'Dreaming Spires' – 11

John Henry Newman's hymn *Lead Kindly Light* might be regarded as a very poignant summary of his life, a journey which began as an evangelical Anglican alumnus of Trinity College, continued as a Fellow of Oriel College and Vicar of St. Mary's, the University church, ending as a Roman Catholic Cardinal, and a canonised saint. He was one of the leaders of the campaign to recover the Church of England's neglected roots in the 'holy Catholic and Apostolic Church' (*Nicene Creed*), the so-called 'The Oxford Movement'. His influence in the Roman Catholic Church has been even more profound, especially in the modernising Second Vatican Council. It is impossible to do justice in a few sentences to the depth and breadth of his theological vision. The verses of one of his hymns serve well as a summary

*Firmly I believe and truly
God is Three, and God is One.....*

While hesitating between the two churches, he purchased a cottage in the village of Littlemore outside the city for a small community of like-minded companions, which is now a R.C. Memorial Centre housing his chapel, library and archive, study facilities and guest accommodation. A more visible memorial, a statue of Newman in Cardinal's robes, is in the grounds of Brompton Oratory, London, the offshoot of the community he established in Birmingham, after his ordination as an R.C. priest.

The London foundation was in the hands of a fellow Oxonian and ally, Frederick Faber (University College, undergraduate and Fellow), whose theological pilgrimage through life mirrored Newman's own. Their temperaments were quite different. Newman was a university man through and through with a formidable intellect, whereas Faber, a Romantic and poet, was unhappy with academic life, and had escaped to a parish in the college's gift where he proved an excellent and much-loved incumbent. Again, a single hymn gives the measure of his ministry there and afterwards in the Oratory. Together with Newman's you have a movingly simple and complete statement of Christian faith and practice.

*There's a wideness in God's mercy
Like the wideness of the sea;
There's a kindness in his justice
Which is more than liberty.*

After they had 'swum the Tiber', as the saying goes, leadership of the campaign fell to Edward Bouverie Pusey (Christ Church, Fellow of Oriel, and Regius Professor of Hebrew), whose wide knowledge of the early Christian theologians and their writings gave it added force. Alarmed by his Catholic view of the Sacraments, the University suspended him for two years. When he died, his extensive library was bought by friends who endowed a building named after him to hold it, whereupon a group of outraged Protestant clergy paid for a defiant monument to confront it across the way. This commemorates the Reformation bishops Latimer and Ridley martyred there and inevitably is on the Oxford tourist circuit sandwiched between sites associated with TV's detective Morse. Meanwhile Pusey House with its chapel, regular services and archival facilities has established itself firmly as the Anglo-Catholic mission to the University and beyond.

Pusey encouraged a group of women to become, as the Sisters of the Holy Cross, the first Anglican nuns since the dissolution of the monasteries, and out of his personal wealth provided a house for them in Regents Park. The Bishop of Exeter later authorised a group as Sisters of Mercy to work among the Devonport poor. Eventually they merged, with Pusey funding the creation of Ascot Priory for them, as Sisters of the Holy Trinity. He died there, as its Warden, and is buried in Christ Church Cathedral.

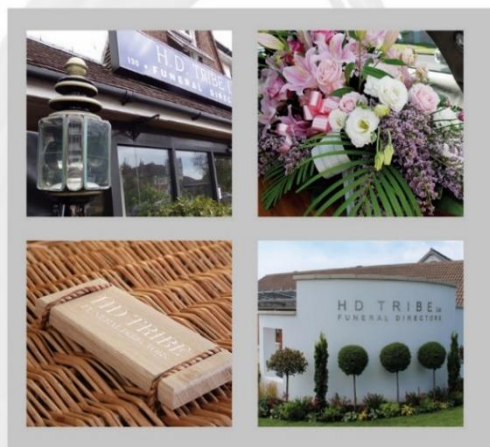


Welcome back to another interesting year. Hope you all had a good Christmas and Celebration for the New Year.

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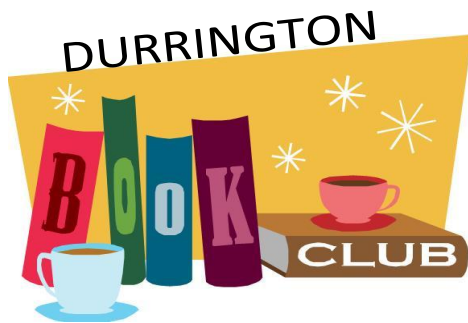

Shrines of Gaiety by Kate Atkinson

In 1920s London, people are shell-shocked, reeling from the effects of the war and most know nothing of 'the evil of the netherworld beneath their feet' as Kate Atkinson so aptly puts it and where she pitches her story.

The youth of the 1920s wanted to party, revelling in just being alive. Clubs spring up out of nowhere, beckoning princes and paupers and, it appears, shady gangland characters. London is a hotbed of villainy and gun running. In the midst of this is one family, six siblings zealously watched over by the matriarch Nellie Coker. We watch as Nellie tries to protect her family as well as presiding over five nightclubs. With her entourage of spies, heavies and corrupt officials, she courageously faces each day with renewed vigour, hunting down her enemies. Chief inspectors and sergeants rub shoulders with criminals, hoping to topple Nellie of her perch and into the gutter, setting her up in her nightclubs, but Nellie, courting danger at every turn, manages to steer a path through for herself and her family.

The author conveys a juxtaposition of the lost lives of war and living, dancing in eternal symbiosis on street corners and dancehalls, adding to this atmospheric narrative. She packs everything into her story, heroes and heroines, at times sad and at times hilarious. She writes an incredibly exciting narrative, a tour de force from start to finish.

Sunday Morning Children's Work

During Advent the children took a look at the Advent wreath through the Jesse Tree.

On the first Sunday in Advent we looked at the Patriarch's – Abraham, Isaac and Jacob and found out what we knew about these great people in the Bible.

On the second week in Advent we looked at the prophet – a huge and fantastic theme. It is amazing what we know about these people and can learn from them. It is also a misconception that the Bible is all about men. In the prophets we see the great courage and example of people like Rahab, Ruth, Esther and many more, but not to forget the great men of these times too.

On the third week in Advent we looked at John the Baptist. As we hear on St John's Gospel, John was sent from God to be the forerunner of the Messiah. Yet even with this being known by him since before birth, the Gospel of the day reminds us that from his prison cell, John sent his followers to Jesus to ask if Jesus truly was the Messiah. This gives us strength when we have our periods of doubt to turn to Christ and ask the same question – and he will answer in the same way as he did to John.

The last week we would have looked at the last three figures before Christmas – The Angel Gabriel, Mary and Joseph.

The Advent Wreath and the Jesse Tree draws us to the central Light of The World and the birth of Jesus.

On Sunday mornings we are looking forward to open the Word of God to all who come and join us for these special times. Thank you to all those who have helped on Sunday Mornings throughout 2025, both lay and clergy. As we move to having more regular Children's Work on Sundays we hope more families will join us and rediscover their faith.

Throughout 2026, I ask you to pray each day for the children's work in our parish and that families may be drawn to God through our work here in Durrington.
