Dear Friends,

October begins for us at St Symphorian's with our Harvest Festival. This is traditionally a time to give thanks to God for a harvest safely gathered in and after Mass there will be the opportunity to enjoy a Bring and Share Lunch together.

Come, ye people, come, raise the song of harvest home; all is safely gathered in, ere the winter storms begin God our maker doth provide for our wants to be supplied; come to God's own temple, come, raise the song of harvest home.

This well-known Harvest hymn was written by Henry Alford in 1844, when he was Rector of Sandford in Buckinghamshire. Alford drew his inspiration from Psalm 100 *Everyone on earth, acclaim the Lord, serve the Lord gladly...*' and the first verse is a celebration of Harvest and calls people to give thanks to God.

At Harvest we thank God for his goodness to us, while at the same time remembering that while we are fortunate in that we have food to eat and water to drink, there are many people who do not; people both close to home and further afield, for whom Harvest is not a time to rejoice. This year we will be supporting SHOUT WSK (Worthing Soup Kitchen). This charity seeks to provide emergency food and support for the homeless and vulnerable in our community and details as to how you can play your part are on the noticeboard at the back of the church.

Regular Giving by Direct Debit

The Parish Giving Scheme (PGS) is a secure and simple way of giving to St Symphorian's Church on a regular monthly basis (or quarterly or annually if you prefer). It works by making a Direct Debit from your bank account on the 1st of the month, which is credited to our parish bank account by the 10th of the month. If eligible, you can opt to add Gift Aid and PGS claims this on our behalf, passing it back to [church] which benefits our cash flow.

Optional Annual Increases

If you opt to increase your gift annually, PGS will write to you and advise you of the new amount. If this is acceptable you don't need to do anything, but you can choose to add more or to decrease the amount if you wish. If the majority of our planned givers were to opt for this, it would have a huge impact on our finances. Like many churches, one of the problems we face is that of 'static giving', often through inertia rather than intention.

One-Off Giving

It is also possible to make a one-off gift online and add Gift Aid if you are eligible. Instead of setting up a new Direct Debit, you use a debit or credit card, Apple Pay or Google Pay. Scan the QR code to get started.

A Look at our Finances

As we enter October it often feels like we enter the money month as we hear adverts for 'free' wills, Harvest, poppy appeals and then the focus turns to Christmas and the writing of the annual accounts. Back in March when we had our last APCM, it was predicted that the coming year would, financially, be hard for us as a church. The financial crisis was biting everyone, and the contracts that had protected the church from major increases had come to an end. Time to take a moment to look at the financial position of the church.

The church works in the same economic environment as our households. As the price of everything goes up in houses, so it does in churches. On top of that, anything that is considered to be 'churchy' usually has a higher price tag on it too! The combined result of this was that by end of July we were £7,000 in the red. And the position appears to be getting worse each month.

There are a few things we can try to do about this, but we need your help!

We would like to increase the number of hall hirers, especially regular hirers of the halls. A starting point for this is to produce advertising banners for Durrington Hill and New Road. This will cost approximately £50. We are asking for donations to enable us to produce these banners.

Our main source of income is from the regular (possibly sacrificial) giving of the worshipping community. As proclaimed in the Act of the Apostles, we are called to share their world goods with God and put our trust in Him to provide for all our needs. Stewardship is time talents and treasure, and we should regularly reflect how we give to God in all of these areas. Do we / can we ever give enough for what He does for us?

The most efficient way to give to the church is through Parish Buying Scheme. Information on this scheme and how to join can be found on the last page. If you need any more help, please see the Stewardship Officer, Paule Harper, or the Parish Treasurer, Jane Winter.

Money in the church, as in all households, is very tight. We are working hard to ensure that every penny is spent according to the wishes of the givers and as effectively as possible, making use of easyfundraising, all discounts, best prices and discount websites at our disposable. Thank you for your support.

Durrington Book Club Next review time will be on 4th October 2023



'The Castaways' by Lucy Clarke.

This story focuses primarily on the relationship between two sisters. We are taken on a tour of flashbacks throughout their lives from childhood to adult hood chronologically separated by an horrific plane crash. The pinnacle of the book is what happens to one of the sisters when she and several other people are marooned on an uninhabited island in the Fijian archipelago after the crash.

There have been many stories written by others on this very subject.


This story however chronicles the separation of the two sisters after a disagreement between them when one of the sisters, Erin, decides not to travel with her sister Lori thus avoiding the crash.

The book divides itself between the horrific Plane Crash that the sister Lori is subjected to and the total determination of her other sister Erin to find her. The reader does not know until the very end whether it is pilot error or plane malfunction and the very survival of the few left behind is pivotal in this regard. The day to day even hour by hour struggle of the survivors is painstakingly written as if the author herself has been through such an ordeal

Many family themes run through the story such as Lori's heartfelt wish to have children, her husband's infidelity in the survival of a baby on board, the care of which falls to Lori being the only female survivor, the mother of the baby having died when the plane crashed.

In the days after the crash what the survivors go through is hauntingly atmospheric. It is as if the reader is there with the survivors so powerful is the authors telling of the story.

The lives of the sisters go through painful transformation after the crash. This is exposed in the horrors the survivors are subjected to. The emotional torment of the supposedly surviving sister and the culmination of the two actually finding each other again. The story leading up to



Lori and Erin finding each other is steeped in intrigue and a foreboding mystery with a surprising twist at the end which keeps the reader enthralled throughout.

The actual crash is cataclysmic and compelling enough as a read but the author keeps the reader spellbound as she writes the story through the eyes of the two sisters involved. Their lives are involved and evolving through Lori fighting for survival along with a few others and the baby and the sister Erin who is desperate to find her and who eventually does so amidst surprising and disturbing events.

If the reader can steel themselves to read this powerful story, I think it is a triumph in human endeavour, very thought-provoking and does not allow the reader a happy ending but provides an insight into the frailty of the human condition.

Book club gave the score as 7.2.

'Lighter Tales from the Chiltern Hills' ...

(These events happened as related but names have been changed out of respect for the good parish folk involved, whose companionship and faith immeasurably enriched my life.)

St.Uriel's Church serves Stableden, a scattering of dwellings off the beaten track, with a large Regency Manor House set in extensive gardens. The medieval village was long ago cleared of people to make way for profitable livestock grazing, the fate of many such in the Vale of Aylesbury. The church fell into ruin, was partly demolished, and later

rebuilt by extending the chancel, and adding a tower, doubtless.to improve the view from the manor.

There was no priest, and a regular congregation of ten in the tale's time. (Recent urban 'development' has since encroached upon its pastoral seclusion).



Consulting with the churchwarden about the annual Festival of Lessons and Carols, he asked if the traditional sequence of readings could be amended to include rather more Old Testament material. He explained that the Manor had come into the ownership of a Jewish family who enjoyed the Christmas season as the occasion for a warm family gathering, and particularly the festival service, to which they liked to make a contribution by providing the flowers. The younger members of the family, of which there were a few, also loved reading the lessons, and they all loved the carol-singing.

With mental apologies to King's College (that prestigious institution itself has abandoned Dean Milner-White's readings and theology) a suitable format was put together. Came the evening of the service and the church interior resembled the Tropical House at Kew. The Manor family arrived, more than doubling the congregation. The young people read beautifully and reverently. Everyone joined lustily in the carols and tucked into the mince pies afterwards, wishing us the happiness of the season as they departed. (And yet the secularists would substitute

'Winterval' for Christmas on the pretext that our rejoicing would offend people of other faiths!)

Afterwards, invited by the churchwarden to help count the collection, it ran into four figures in high denomination notes. "Now you see", he said, "why we changed the pattern. This will keep us going for another year".

Another season, another place. High up in the hills, buried in the woods, is the hamlet of Deansend. The guide book says it boasts of a church - a little hall-type building - a village hall proper, a village pond, and lanes that become impassable in the winter. Once it had two pubs and a



shop. Arriving at St.Lazarus's to take its Harvest Festival and waiting for the key-holder to arrive, one might have reflected on the aptness of the dedication. When she came it was with the tidings that the lady who played the harmonium was sick, but she knew of somebody in a neighbouring village who might step in. While waiting her return, the congregation arrived — a young father and his little daughter bearing a bunch of grapes. On her reappearance with the 'somebody' in tow, a further trial: he did not have hymns in his repertoire, nor sheet music, but thought he could play by ear 'O God our help in ages past' and 'Jerusalem'. Well, "Where two or three are gathered......", so with two good hymns, prayer, a bunch of grapes, priest, organist and a faithful gathering of three, Deansend gave thanks for the harvest in that year, as ever.

Not long after the event described above, Stableden manor house and grounds were purchased by a highly rated Pop Star, who hired a well-known and expensive Celebrity Chef for his partying. I do not know whether or not St.Uriel's continued to enjoy the manorial bounty.

Following the Morocco earthquake, The British Red Cross launched an emergency appeal to help support people affected.

On Friday 8 September, 11pm local time, a 6.8 magnitude earthquake struck Morocco. The epicentre was in the High Atlas Mountains, approximately 70 kilometres south of Marrakesh. A 4.9 magnitude aftershock followed just 20 minutes later.

Local authorities are reporting that more than 2,900 people have died, with many more critically injured. The total number of people affected is in the hundreds of thousands.

Many of the worst affected areas are remote and mountainous, and the impact of the earthquake has made them even harder to reach.

People have lost everything. Homes have been reduced to rubble and survivors are in need of basic support like shelter, food and water.

Help now by donating to the Morocco Earthquake appeal.

How is the Red Cross helping people affected by the earthquake?

Local Moroccan Red Crescent teams were on the ground immediately responding to the earthquake. They are supporting authorities with:

- search and rescue
- provision of water, food, shelter and hygiene kits
- evacuation
- first aid
- transportation of injured people to hospital
- psychosocial support

As the situation develops, their teams will continue to help with the severe and immediate needs of those affected, as well as planning the longer-term support that will be needed in the weeks and months to come.

In response to the catastrophic flooding in Libya the British red Cross launched an emergency appeal to support the people affected.

On Sunday 10 September, Storm Daniel hit north-eastern Libya, causing strong winds and sudden heavy rainfall. The result was devastating flash floods, where "tsunami-like" waves swept away everything in their path.

In the port city of Derna, two dams burst under the pressure and entire neighbourhoods were destroyed by the three-metre-high flood waters. Thousands of people were killed, and bridges, buildings and vital infrastructure were badly damaged.

The eastern cities of Benghazi, Sousa, and Al-Marj also experienced flash flooding and, like Derna, are in urgent need of vital aid and support.

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Update from Chichester Cathedral



New Workshop for Church Art to be established in Chichester.

On Thursday 14th September The Bishop of Arundel and Brighton, The Right Reverend Richard Moth, blessed the new Chichester Workshop for Liturgical Art, at an event in South Harting hosted jointly with The Bishop of Chichester, The Right Reverend Dr Martin Warner.

Guests including the Lord Lieutenant of West Sussex, Lady Emma Barnard, the Duchess of Richmond, as well as leading local artists, who gathered to see some of the recent artwork produced by the Workshop - including a nine-foot crucifix for Aberdeen's Roman Catholic Cathedral.

Working with Chichester
Cathedral, the Chichester
Workshop seeks to be an
international centre for the
production and teaching of
traditional liturgical art. Using
skills and material that have
been employed since the early
centuries of the Christian




Church, the three artists currently involved in the Workshop, James Blackstone, Martin Earle and Aidan Hart, are working on commissions across a broad range of traditional media from people all over the world and across the Christian traditions. Whether making crucifixes, icons, altars or croziers for use in worship, the Workshop also seeks – through apprenticeships – to sustain these ancient artistic traditions for future generations.

An educational programme being developed in association with the Canon Precentor at Chichester Cathedral, The Reverend Dr Daniel Inman, also seeks to explain the importance of art in worship for the wider Church, believing, as the artists describe it, that liturgical art 'presents a vision of the heavenly glories, and earth transformed'.

Speaking of the Workshop, the Bishop of Chichester, Dr Martin Warner, said,

"Damage on a global scale is a recurring feature of this century. We see it in our misuse of the environment, in war, poverty, and injustice. The Christian response is the quest for recovery of the sacred. This recovery reconfigures our damaged lives and environment. It endlessly restores a sense of the freedom and joy of being made by God and destined for life with God. Art plays an indispensable role in helping us to recover the sacred. Beyond words, and independent of fashion or finance, it can shape in our imagination an aptitude and delight in this world, in ourselves and in each other. I welcome the Chichester Workshop project, which is necessarily ecumenical and refreshingly profound in its thought and purpose."

By 2025, it is hoped, the Workshop will be established in the Cathedral Close itself, expressing a continuity in artistic production and commissioning at Chichester that stretches back to the Cathedral's first decades and witnessed in the famous Lazarus reliefs of the 1120s that are found in the south aisle.

The Cathedral will be hosting a special service to celebrate Black History Month on 7th October with Guy Hewitt, the Church of England's first Racial Justice Director with contributions from our church of England School choirs.
